Rector's Message

Since Christmas the senior school has primarily focused on supporting our pupils with SQA internal assessments, subject prelims and assessments and a few subject external SQA assessments. The changes to SQA exams and internal arrangements have caused significant extra challenges to all our stakeholders and as we approach the Easter break I am sure that everyone is breathing a sigh of relief that we have managed to get to the break with everything we need to do in this area, now done. The process was made even more difficult as a result of staff absences in both the teaching staff and in the Admin staff, something which is always unavoidable but in these times of financial constraint where we have no extra contingency cover something which takes us close to breaking point. The fact that all staff and pupils have worked so well and so hard to complete all that is now asked of us is something which, for me, embodies the spirit of learning which Madras College excels in.

In junior school the staff and pupils have also worked very hard trying to make sure all pupils have made very good progress in their broad general education with special emphasis on supporting the course choice process, which is of course seen as a crucial part of all pupils' progression.

A new measure of attainment called the Broad General Education Benchmark Toolkit was launched this year by the Scottish Government, and I am delighted to report that the Madras College attainment data is outstanding showing that we have overtaken or been in line with our Scottish school comparators in all elements measured (Numeracy and Literacy).

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This term saw a few special government visits to madras. In January we were selected to be inspected on a themed inspection of Mathematics and Numeracy. This type of inspection is a one day inspection and receives verbal feedback and a written note in the report on the Scottish wide information (due to be published around September time). In the verbal feedback we were given the inspectors said:

"Madras attainment in N5 Numeracy and N5 Maths is in line or above the Virtual Comparators (and has shown this for the past 3 years) where before it had been below or significantly below – so you have been doing something which has changed this attainment and we (the inspectors) feel we have seen the work in the school which has contributed to this improvement."

In February we received a visit from Mr Graham Dey, the minister for parliamentary business and Armed Forces Veterans. During the course of this visit Mr Dey met and spoke with a staff focus group and a pupil focus to gauge the challenges which children of Armed Forces Families can experience and how the school supports those young people. In February we also were given sight of the publication relating to Madras College (although it will be anonymised) of the outcome of the visit from the government commissioned case study team reporting on Attainment Fund delivery and impact – which for us was our investment of PEF money and its impact and delivery across the school. The case study team said: "As a result of this the school has seen a positive impact for the targeted pupils, and across the school more broadly in the overall improvement in the school's culture of learning and

> attainment. The largest impact appears in Numeracy where interventions have helped to close the gap in this attainment. There has also been substantial impact on the confidence and self-esteem of targeted pupils. This is seen as a crucial element in enabling improved attainment, reflecting the fundamental importance of building pupils' willingness and capacity to engage with the curriculum. There has been a positive impact for attendance of the targeted groups and a reduction in exclusions since the development of targeted interventions by the school. PEF support has also contributed to more leadership opportunities for staff the

Physics Department Update

Ceres Holographics Visit

Recently the AH physics pupils visited the offices and workshops of Ceres Holographics.

After a short presentation of the company's work in their new offices in town, the pupils were shown and amazed by the company's award winning ' normal ' holograms'. They also had a chance to sit in the demonstration of the company's current main development of 'heads up display' for car windscreens.

The company is working with many major car manufacturers and it is planned that within 5-10 years these displays will be in most cars. It would also mean that passengers could watch films on the windscreen and satellite navigation instructions would be displayed on windscreens in 'augmented reality'.



After this pupils travelled to the manufacturing unit in the New Technology Centre in North Haugh to see how the holographic films for the windscreen are produced. Look at the mesmerising machine in the picture! It is hoped that some closer links with the company may lead to collaborative work for senior pupils in the near future

British Physics Olympiad

Recently some S4 and S5 pupils studying physics have taken part in the GCSE and AS level Physics Challenges set by the British Physics Olympiad scheme, organised by Oxford University.

These very challenging papers are made even more difficult as they are based on the English curriculum.

In the GSCE challenge, Tim Edwards achieved a Silver Award, Alisa O'Riordan and Rory Thiel got Bronze with Patricia O'Riordan, Fin McGhie, Eilidh Harper and Dugald MacFarlane getting commendations.

In the AS level challenge Robert Williamson got Bronze with Lachlan Brennan, Joseph Mackie and Daniel Dykes getting commendations.

The awards are based on % of presentations and some schools have clubs that practice all year for the papers, so our pupils' performance is very pleasing.

Science Roadshow

In Feb St Andrews University again visited the Kilrymont Road Building to present a Science Roadshow to all S1.

The aim was to improve the number of pupils taking 2 or more sciences in S2and 3. This now annual event is well received and as always the liquid nitrogen/ super magnets and angular momentum demos were the favourites.

Girls into Physics and **Engineering' Day**

In Jan, 15 S3 girls travelled to Broughty Ferry for this day run by the Institute of Physics.

There were many workshops giving the girls hands on experience and problem solving tasks. These included Tower building by Institute of Civil Engineers, Rocket building by Edinburgh University, building to design by RAF and pattern building by Fife College.

Last year's visit did encourage more girls to take up physics and engineering, hopefully this years will as well.

Modern Languages News

Business Brunch Event

In January eleven S4 Modern Languages pupils joined schools across Tayside to engage with local businesses at the University of Dundee. Over 100 young learners heard from a range of business leaders who view language skills as key to the growth and success of their company. The Business Brunch demonstrated the relevance of languages in a work context and aimed to encourage pupils to continue with their language studies into the senior phase of their secondary education, and beyond school.

Speakers included Senior Staff from companies including Dover Fuelling Solutions, Michelin Tyre PLC, Outplay Entertainment, Scottish Dance Theatre and Scottish Engineering. There was also an opportunity for pupils to speak with representatives from



businesses and organisations in the Marketplace such as: Al-Maktoum College, Glamis Castle, Royal Air Force, Royal Navy / Royal Marines, The British Army, The Open University in Scotland, The Royal Zoological Society of Scotland and the University of Dundee.

One of the pupils commented: "I didn't know how helpful it was to know a second language. I learnt today how different businesses use languages and why it is beneficial to learn a language at school."

Paul Sheerin from Scottish Engineering commented: "This was a great opportunity for Scottish Engineering to press the importance of languages to our future workforce. Our business tends towards international operations, and we will increase our competitiveness as a trading nation with people who, through language learning, understand how to communicate and connect with people around the world."



The event was organised by SCILT, Scotland's National Centre for Languages based at University of Strathclyde, in partnership with the University Council for Modern Languages Scotland (UCMLS).

SCHOOL EXCHANGES – France, Germany, Spain

It's been a busy term in the Modern Languages department preparing for the three exchanges taking place this year. In May twenty pupils we will be heading off to Loches, St Andrews' twin town in France. The pupils will be staying with their French partners and will have the chance to participate in lessons at school and enjoy a range of excursions such as visits to châteaux of the Loire and also a theme park. In class pupils have been learning new language topics to prepare them for the trip, such as food, places in town and asking for directions.

Preparations are now well underway for the 62nd Kiel Exchange visit. S4 pupils who visited their exchange partners last year are looking forward to being reunited with their German partners here in June, while S3 pupils are getting very excited about meeting their partners for the first time before making the return trip to Kiel in June next year.

At the end of September a group of twenty S3 and S4 pupils will travel to our partner school, IES Camilo José Cela, in Madrid. The Spanish will spend a week with us at the end of October.

SURPRISE FRENCH VISITOR

S1 and S4 pupils were surprised in February when French footballer Will Edjenguélé from Paris joined their French classes.

Will is signed to Dundee United but is currently on loan to Falkirk. He answered questions put to him in French by pupils and spoke of his time at one of the French football academies before going on to play in France, England (for Coventry City and Bury) and, most notably, for top Greek team Panetolikos. Will was happy to help Miss MacEachen's S4 class with their speaking

practice and said that he was most impressed by their French.

Next up was a much better team performance racking up a reasonable score against Beath HS. The final pool game finished 23-21 to Madras in a tense game which gave the boys a runners-up spot in Pool 1 meaning they were drawn
